2016 KIPP Alumni Survey



A note on methods

- In the fall of 2016, the KIPP Foundation sent an electronic survey to roughly 10,000 KIPP alumni over the age of 18 via text message and email. We define an alumni as any student who completed 8th grade at a KIPP middle school, or 12th grade at a KIPP high school.
- Of those, we received 3,470 responses. After removing students who opted out of the survey and who are not currently enrolled in higher education, we were left with 2,969 responses to analyze.
- Students did not necessarily answer all questions. The data in this 2016 Alumni Survey reflects only the students that answered the question at hand. Sample size is noted on the data slides.
- The demographics of the respondents closely matches that of our population of alumni in college, so we feel that these results are representative. KIPP students, and therefore KIPP alumni, are predominantly students of color and come from low-income families. Over 95% of KIPP students are African American or Latino, and nearly 90% of students qualify for free or reduced price lunch.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

What are the experiences of our alumni in college?

- ~1/3 of alumni live at home during college.
- ~1/4 of alumni in college financially support family members (1/3 of 2 year students, 1/5 of 4 year students).

- More than half of alumni work at least one job while in college (more than 10% work multiple jobs).




As students age, more move from on campus to off campus, but the % living at home stays consistent

Large portion of alumni experience food insecurity; More than 40% have missed meals, nearly 60% worry about food




While in college, I have missed meals to have money for books, fees, or other school expenses.

More than half of alumni work at least one job while in college (more than 10% work multiple jobs)


Number of jobs currently working while in college, by year in school




By Year in School

Of alumni who work during school and qualify for work study, over 40% have not yet found a work study job. Students at less competitive colleges have a harder time finding work study jobs.


Work study status of of alumni who work during school and qualify for work study
