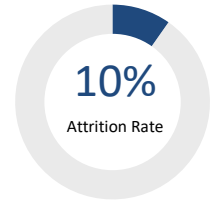

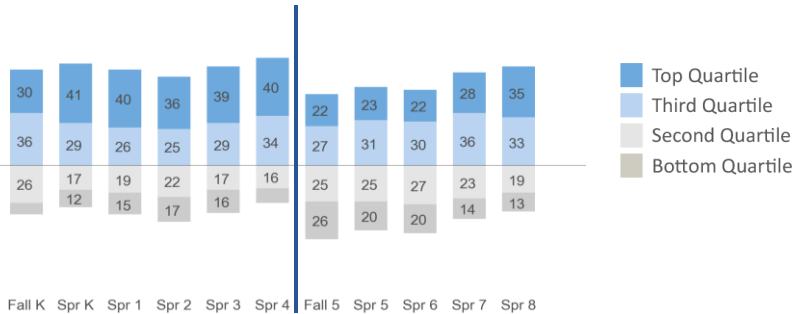

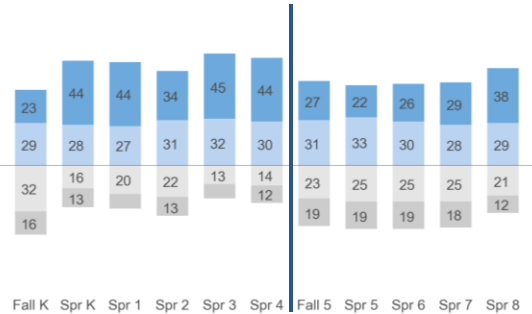

Reading



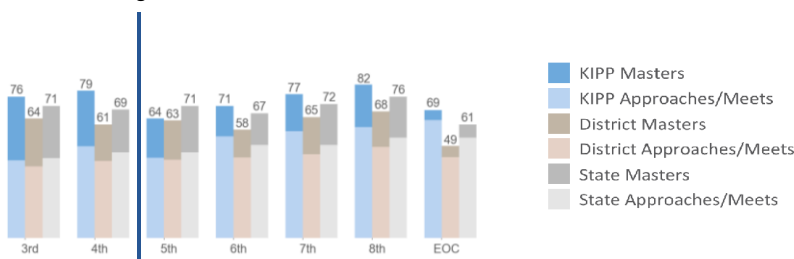

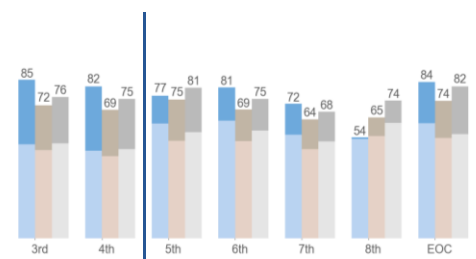
HOW ARE WE PERFORMING RELATIVE TO OUR LOCAL COMMUNITY?
